





Erasmus+: New challenges and great awards.

The Erasmus+ collaborations are an integral part of the work of the Play Fair Code. The cooperations with top international partners within the projects “Anti Match-Fixing Top Training” and “Against Match Fixing” in 2018 again highlighted that the expertise of the Play Fair Code is welcomed at the European level.

SUCCESS Story and BEST PRACTICE EXAMPLE

Erasmus+ project “European Rookie Cup” awarded as SUCCESS Story and BEST PRACTICE EXAMPLE by the European Commission.

It was with great pleasure for the **Austrian Erste Bank Icehockey League**, project coordinator of the **European Rookie CUP** and passionately supported by the Play Fair Code since day one, announcing the **European Commission’s high-quality awards**.

Fourteen project partners (among them the Ice Hockey Federations of Italy, Slovenia, Hungary, Austria, and the International Ice Hockey Federation IIHF) as well as the Austrian expert partners of the **Play Fair Code**, the **NADA**, the **Fairplay Initiative**, and the **Finnish elite icehockey school Vierumäki** were proved right in presenting a win-win format combining a unique icehockey rookie-event with awareness-raising and education training sessions for young athletes on the topic of integrity in sport (match-fixing, doping, and discrimination). The **focus** in the awareness raising and education sessions by NADA Austria, the Fairplay Initiative, and the Play Fair Code among approximately 1,100 junior athletes, coaches, and referees was clearly **set to sensitize to the dangers** of doping, discrimination, and match-fixing.

**Kick-off on the Erasmus+ project “Against Match Fixing”**

Günter Kaltenbrunner, President Play Fair Code: “Meanwhile, we have been able to gather some routine in our work on the Erasmus+ program of the European Union. We are now in the position to transfer the expertise of our national and international activities as real added value into the new Erasmus+ projects.”

Following the completion of the two Erasmus+ projects “Fix the Fixing” and “European Rookie Cup” in 2017, the cooperation with the Polish football league Ekstraklasa underlines the **continuing interest** of high-profile international partners in the Austrian **best practice approach of the Play Fair Code**. “Against Match Fixing” is the fourth Erasmus+ project with the participation of the Play Fair Code. The kick-off event took place in Warsaw in February 2018.

The general objective of “Against Match Fixing” is the academic and practical development of internationally applicable guidelines in the educational field. In addition to a detailed **overview of the European legal situation** in the fields of criminal and disciplinary law, for the first time also jurisdictions in South America and Asia, will also be included in the analysis.

In addition to the Ekstraklasa and the Play Fair Code, the National Sports Academy NSA (Sofia, Bulgaria), the European Sport Security Association ESSA (Brussels, Belgium), the Centro Universitario Sportivo CUS (Palermo, Italy), the European Institute for Interdisciplinary Research EIIR (Paris, France), and the German Sport University (Cologne, Germany) are further distinctive and valuable project partners.

IIHF WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

IIHF integrity education seminars at the IIHF Ice Hockey World Championship in Budapest



The IIHF World Championship Division I Group A is the **second highest tournament in international ice hockey**. In 2018 out of the total of the six participating nations (Kazakhstan, Italy, Great Britain, Slovenia, Poland, and Hungary), the top two teams will qualified for the next IIHF World Championship featuring the 16 most prestigious hockey nations in the world in 2019. The IIHF commissioned the Play Fair Code to conduct integrity workshops for players and officials of the participating nations

In the workshops general **information** about **competition manipulation and match-fixing, the related consequences** and specific cases including exemplary video footage from the world of ice hockey as well as from other sports globally are presented and analysed with the players while explaining the huge impact of betting related and non-betting related activities on the modern world of sport. Moreover the workshops **aim** to give an **understanding** of concrete means of self-protection and measures to **safeguard individual careers** including a practical insight into the relevant sections of the IIHF Statutes and the IIHF Code of Conduct.

Play Fair Code President Günter Kaltenbrunner confirmed the positive impression from the training sessions and said: "The issue of match-fixing has become important for the IIHF not least because of a match-fixing attempt by two players at the last year's IIHF tournament."

MEETING OF EU SPORT DIRECTORS IN SOFIA

Upon the invitation of **Viktoria Slavkova, chairwoman of the working group** for sports of the Bulgarian EU Council Presidency, CEO Severin Moritzer participated at the informal meeting of the EU Sport Directors in Sofia in mid-June.

As part of the forthcoming handover of the EU Presidency to Austria, **Barbara Spindler-Oswald**, as delegate of the Austrian Federal Ministry for the Civil Service and Sport, spoke about the priorities of the Austrian Presidency in European sports.

In addition to a presentation on the latest efforts against match-fixing and integrity in sport in the Austrian and international context, **Severin Moritzer** presented the Play Fair Code as an established and Europe-wide recognized association in the prevention work against match fixing and betting fraud. Special attention was drawn to a brief look into the world of eSports and the strategic direction of the Play Fair Code in terms of this economic and social phenomenon.

INTERPOL-IOC WORKSHOP

Play Fair Code at the INTERPOL-IOC Integrity in Sport Regional Workshop



Following the invitation of INTERPOL and the International Olympic Committee (IOC), which initiated this event, the Play Fair Code together with top representatives of the Austrian NOC and the Austrian Federal Police was pleased to contribute from a best-practice perspective in Austria.

The focus of the two-day event in November 2018 was to identify key stakeholders involved in setting up National Platforms in the three participating countries Germany, Switzerland and Austria to facilitate national, regional and international cooperation. The clear goal of all participants was to create a common ground to prevent and investigate competitive manipulation and other threats to the integrity of sport.

Thomas Arnold, Chief Financial Officer of the German Olympic Sports Confederation (DOSB), said: "Protecting the integrity of sport is the key to the future of sport."

Play Fair Code President Günter Kaltenbrunner said: *"Especially in the prevention field a lot has already been achieved in Austria over the last years. We are building on this foundation now to take the next steps."*

AGREEMENT WITH SPORTRADAR

Strengthen ties with Sportradar

The Play Fair Code has signed a memorandum of understanding with Sportradar as one of the world's leading supplier of sports integrity solutions.

The relationship between Play Fair Code and Sportradar will strengthen the ties between the two organisations and will incorporate the exchange of know-how and best-practices with a strong focus in the education and prevention field to reach their common objectives of fighting corruption in sport across Austria and worldwide with joint approaches. Moreover, the cooperation will also ensure mutual coordination and support of their efforts and advocacy before international and European authorities and institutions.

Sportradar's Managing Director of Integrity Services Andreas Krannich said: *"We are very proud to be sharing our expertise with the Play Fair Code. The information we can provide from our monitoring and detection system including our advanced intelligence, investigation, education, and consultancy will cover all bases. Combined with PFC's in-depth expertise in the education field we will mutually support each other."*

eSports

Kick-off on the first eSport project

The eSport study project in cooperation with the Ostfalia University of Applied Sciences in Germany was launched in April 2018. A student group developed a project report about the points of reference and the relevance for the Play Fair Code with and to eSport.

eSport, the competitive playing of computer games, has gained enormous relevance in recent years. In addition, eSport will be an Olympic discipline for the first time at the Asia Games 2022. In Germany, the government has emphasized in the current coalition program that eSport should be promoted and recognized as sport.

The project goal is the evaluation of similarities, points of reference, and possible risks and chances in a training and information activity of the Play Fair Code in Austrian and international eSport. In addition to a presentation of the project results, the students will provide a final project report, which will serve as an understandable processing of the results and can be used for further specializations about the topic. The conclusion of the project group, together with concrete recommendations for action from a neutral and scientific perspective, will be used for the operational activities of the Play Fair Code as well as for the information of the Play Fair Code partner network.

The Austrian Tennis Federation and the Play Fair Code – Integrity partnership and prevention

As part of an invitation from the Austrian Tennis Federation executive board, the Play Fair Code had the opportunity to present the global problem of match-fixing in the world sport tennis from an expert's perspective. At the same time prevention strategies for Austrian tennis were presented in the field of awareness raising and education.

From 2019 on, an intensive cooperation between the two institutions has been agreed on.

The invitation to the Play Fair Code reflects the value and sustainability attached to the subject of integrity in tennis by the top executives within the Austrian Tennis Federation and shows the proactive approach in Austrian tennis.

Günter Kaltenbrunner, President of the Play Fair Code, sums it up:

“Being a single sport, tennis by far is the easiest to manipulate sporting discipline. With more than 200 annual suspected cases worldwide and numerous manipulations that have actually been proven, tennis unfortunately is in a negative leader role.

Tennis is enormously popular in Austria. It is therefore very positive having top sports associations such as the Austrian Tennis Federation to recognize the need for active prevention.

Interview. Die Spitze des Play Fair Code über den Kampf gegen die Spielmanipulation

Seit dem Fall Taboga wurden 15.000 Sportler, Funktionäre, Trainer und Schiedsrichter vom Play Fair Code geschult. Gegründet worden war der Verein auf Initiative von Sportministerin, ÖFB und Fußball-Bundesliga aber schon davor. „Und das war gut. Denn als Herbst 2013 manche den Fußball generell verurteilen wollten, konnte entgegen werden: Der Play Fair Code war schon bei allen damals 20 Bundesliga-Vereinen, um erstmals eine Schulung vorzunehmen“, erinnert sich Geschäftsführer Severin Moritzer. Gemeinsam mit Präsident Günter Kaltenbrunner hat er sich der Präventionsarbeit in Österreich Sport verschrieben.
